

Reception—5:00–6:30 p.m.


Sharlot Hall auditorium-Education Bldg

WEDNESDAY—ANNUAL STATE MEETING & LUNCHEON—VAN DICKSON RANCH—SKULL VALLEY \$40

This private, historic ranch just 25 minutes from Spring Hill Suites was homesteaded in 1906 by James Van Dickson and his wife, Pearl. James was the son of John Van Dickson who came with the Walker Party to the Prescott/Skull Valley area in the early 1860s. The Walker Party, a group of prospectors and frontiersman, discovered gold in 1863 in the Bradshaw Mountains west of Prescott. Fast forward to 1999 when Paul and Carolyn Harris purchased the ranch and eventually turned it into a wedding venue.



West Iron Springs Rd—19 miles (28 minutes) from Springhill Suites hotel.

THE PROGRAM

Judy McBride, President of the Beaver Creek Historical Society, presents ***“Rimrock Ranch: From Dudes to Mobsters”***—the story of a 1920s era working ranch-turned dude ranch-turned mafia house that Judy eventually purchased. Her presentation includes the site's fascinating history and photographs of the property.

The following *optional and free* activity takes place immediately following the conclusion of the State meeting. It does require pre-registration. When making your State meeting reservations, let your chapter treasurer know if you wish to participate in the “Kirkland experience”:

Kirkland Bar and Steakhouse Tour

On Iron Springs Rd. 7 miles southeast from the Van Dickson Ranch turnoff. This nationally registered historic site dates to the 1870s—once a Wells Fargo stage stop,



a store, hotel, and post office, a rail ticket office and a community center. The current structure was built in 1923 after a fire partially burned the original building. New owner Charles Tramont will guide you through a brief history and tour, including the newly transformed B&B area which reportedly once housed a brothel. Before leaving, check out the country store for goodies such as locally made jams, jellies, relishes such as candied jalapenos, carrot cake butter, and pineapple relish. If you are on the route home, grab for dinner one of their to-go specialty sandwiches and a lemonade!
